
THANK YUV!

Like many other nonprofits, we canceled our spring fundraiser, Gin & Phonics, and pivoted our programming efforts to support students learning from home. Remote learning is a challenge for all students but can be especially challenging for students with learning differences. 

MIND* YOUTH PROGRAM

*Mentoring, Inspiring & Nurturing Differences

Students love our MIND programs! Unfortunately, we were only able to hold two of our usual four events before the pandemic began (a Self-Advocacy Skills Workshop, below right, and our Winter Social at Promontory's Tubing Hill); however, the 40 students and eight Mentors who participated are eager for event planning to begin again!

MIND welcomes all students in the Park City area with learning differences in grades K-12. Older students become MIND Mentors and help organize and run our events.

THE DUMBEST KID IN CLASS

The second time my happy, energetic, intelligent, empathetic, wonderful third grade boy told me that that he "didn't want to be in this life" and he was "the dumbest kid" in his class it really caught my attention. Our journey in to the discovery of dyslexia began.

Through a visit to a child psychologist we learned that our son was having a difficult time with and "hated" reading. After a reading evaluation, we were told he likely had dyslexia and we were lucky to be in Park City because of PC READS. We contacted them and quickly received a response, including resources, references, and a course of action for further testing. PC READS kept in close contact through the process, which confirmed the diagnosis. We were assigned an Advocate, providing guidance and support above and beyond anything hoped for. She attended meetings with us and we were able to get the school accommodations my son needed formalized through a 504 Plan.

Since then, we have attended PC READS meetings and our son has met more kids with dyslexia through their youth program. He has found this explanation for his way of learning a relief and even very interesting. He makes no more comments about "not wanting to be here" and instead says reading is one of his favorite activities. He has even noted with wonder a couple of times, "I'm really smart!" Through my tears of joy let me tell you how fortunate we are to have PC READS and their Advocate Program in our community.
